Wardens will scour the country and any nimrod caught exceeding the limit or bagging birds in an illegal way will be arrested and prosecuted. Twelve quail may be killed each day from November 11 to December 9, says the Illinois game law. Three prairie chickens may be killed per day from November 12 to November 17. The prairie chickens are exceedingly scarce in this state. Quail are plentiful this fall.
