Large Fire at Reddick.

On Tuesday night about 8 o'clock it was discovered the L. C. Badgley & Sons hardware store was on fire; an immediate alarm was given but in a short time the whole interior was one mass of roaring flames and smoke which made it impossible to enter the building. When it was seen that the building was beyond saving, all efforts were put forth to save the adjoining buildings. Splendid work was done by the fire engine and their efforts finally were rewarded as they saved the building south from burning, although it was badly damaged, due to the falling brick wall of the Badgley store and the north wall fell onto a steel covered implement shed, demolishing it and the farm tools which it contained.

The origin of the fire will probably never be known, but it might have been due to crossed electric wires. Mr. Badgley had closed up his store early that evening as there were but a few people around.

The hardware and opera house were a total loss, as not a thing was saved. Mr. Badgley was owner of the stock. It amounted to \$10,000 and was insured for about \$7,000. The building was owned by U. S. Allison, of Gardner, Illinois. There was \$4,000 insurance on it. The saloon building was owned by the Schlitz Brewing Company, also the the fixtures. N. P. Pederson owned the stock of liquors in the saloon.

Buildings on the east side of the street facing the burning building were in great danger for the wind blew straight towards them and the heat was terrible. It broke all the plate glass in the large front windows in the M. F. Reilly building and for a time the chances of saving that building were very doubtful. Most all the glass in the front of the Century building was broken.
