FIRE LADDIES KEPT BUSY.

Two Residences Partially Destroyed by Flames the Latter Part of Last Week.

Last Friday evening about 7:15 o'clock neighbors discovered fire at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Mathison on East Seminole street. The alarm was immediately sent in and the fire bell sounded the news broadcast over the city and brought a large number of people to the scene.

The fire company responded quickly to the call and within a short time had the flames which were raging in the upper part of the house under control and only a portion of the residence was damaged to any great extent.

The fire seemed to have originated on the inside from a defective chimney and had gained considerable headway before noticed. The occupants of the house were not home at the time of the fire.

The damage although not very great was fully covered by insurance.

About 6:30 o'clock last Saturday morning an engineer on a Chicago & Alton engine noticed that the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Sorenson on West Chippewa street was afire and immediately sounded the shrill whistle of the engine which aroused the entire community.

A short while after the clamor of the fire bell was heard and the fire department rushed to the scene. They did splendid work in fighting the fire, and having good water pressure extinguished the flames in a short time.

The fire started near the chimney on the inside and at the time of the discovery fire had broke out in several places on one side of the roof.

The house was damaged considerably by both fire and water but was fully covered by insurance.




