## ARRANGE FOR FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

Director Mason and Many Committeemen Present—The Next County Meeting to Be Jan. 14, 15, 16.

Pursuant to call of President Omar P. Wagner, of the Livingston County Farmers' Institute, representatives from the different committees of the county institute, and from the several local institutes met Wednesday forenoon at the Livingston County National Bank to arrange the dates and programs for next year's meetings. The men present were Director S. B. Mason, of Normal; I. H. Hull, of Saunemin; and Messrs. O. P. Wagner, Roy C. Bishop, William Mies and Arthur Verner, of Pontiac, and John J. Doherty, of Dwight. The ladies were represented by Mesdames F. E. Richter and Henry Mies, of Saunemin; Charles Moffet, of Epards Point; C. W. Lovingsfoss and Miss Lawrence, of Pontiac.

It was decided to hold the county institute on January 14, 15 and 16, 1914, in Pontiac. Local institutes were provided for as follows: Saunemin and Planagan, January 6 and 7; Dwight and Chatsworth, January 8 and 9. The local institute for Fairbury has been given up. A school of instruction is to take its place. This school will probably be inaugurated at the time of their agricultural fair, and if successful will be made a permanent annual affair.

In the discussion of arrangements for programs and speakers, the idea was advanced that all programs at all meetings at all institutes should be so planned and arranged to forward the work of the Livingston County Crop Association under the direction of the county agent, Roy C. Bishop. One entire day at the county institute will be given to the work and reports of this association. The topics mentioned most prominently for discussion were Horses, Swine, and Soil Building. County Agent Bishop expects to be able to report on from twenty to thirty demonstration farms that are now planned in the county. Successful alfalfa raising will be called to the attention of those attending the institute. The household science folks are to have two speakers at each institute. The second evening at the county institute is to be given to the public schools and an attempt will be made to have an address by State Superintendent F. G. Blair, at that time. A greater effort than ever before will be made to arouse an interest in those phases of the institute that may be connected with the public schools. More attention is to be given to the essay writing and to the giving a part in the work of the institute to school children. Especially is the aid of the rural schools to be sought.

Mr. Doherty, of Dwight, explained how the farmers in that vicinity financed their own institute by issuing membership cards at one dollar each, instead of going among the business men soliciting funds. This plan increases attendance, interest and membership, and makes it really a farmers' institute. The county and local institutes will follow this plan.—Pontiac Leader.
