SENIOR CLASS PLAY.

The Senior Class of the Dwight High School Give Successful and Amusing Play at Opera House.

One of the best amateur performances ever given in Dwight was the Class Play given by the Seniors of the Dwight High School Friday evening of last week. Indeed, it was a great deal better than many professional plays witnessed, as the parts were well cast and each played his role exceptionally well.

The curtain raiser was the little one act play "Op, O Me Thumb," the scene of which was laid in England, in the working room of Madame Dider's Laundry in Soho. The part of Madame Dider was taken by Miss Agnes Korsgaard, and her assistants, Clem, Celeste, Rose Jordan and Amanda Affick, were played respectively by Misses Mayme Chase, Evelyn McKee, Ruth Brendley and Lucile Van Eman. All did very well indeed with their roles; the longer parts were those of Amanda Affick and Horace Green-smith, played by Miss Van Eman and Mr. Wayne Vickery, and they gave a very fine account of themselves in those two rather difficult characters.

Long's orchestra furnished excellent music at the opening of the entertainment and between acts. The opera house was packed to the doors with an appreciative audience.

The Seniors went to Gardner last Saturday evening and presented the play there to a large house, clearing about \$25.

Notice to Observe Speed Limits.

Notice is hereby given to all owners and drivers of automobiles, motorcycles or other motor vehicles that from and after this date the provisions of the State law fixing the limit of speed in the Village will be rigidly enforced and prosecutions will follow violations thereof. Police officers have been instructed to make arrests in all cases where the speed limit as fixed is exceeded.

Not to exceed ten miles an hour through the business section or closely built up portion of the Village.

Not to exceed fifteen miles an hour through the residence portion of the Village.

Not to exceed six miles an hour when going around a corner or curve.

Complaints of violations, if accompanied with proof sufficient to convict will be prosecuted under the direction of the Village authorities, and any one witnessing violations should report the same at once to the Village officers.

Notice is also given that all riding of bicycles upon the sidewalks of the Village must be stopped and any violations of the ordinance regulating this will be prosecuted.

ODD FELLOWS ANNIVERSARY.

Celebrated by Local Lodge Thursday Evening—Large Number in Attendance.

On Thursday evening Dwight Lodge No. 513 celebrated the 94th anniversary of the founding of Odd Fellowship in their lodge rooms. A number of invitations had been issued and a generous response was the result, over two hundred gathering for the meeting.

The call to order was given by J. B. Hayes, chairman of the anniversary committee, and after a selection by Long's orchestra, the Anniversary hymn by the assembly and invocation by M. A. Messlein, he, in a few well chosen words, welcomed the brothers, the sisters of the Rebekah Lodge and the visitors. The response was by Mrs. Maud Wilkinson for the Rebekahs.

The address of the evening was by M. A. Messlein, who spoke along the line of Odd Fellowship. He told of the founding of the order ninety-four years ago, the benefits derived from membership and the pleasures he had had from being affiliated with the lodge and seeing the exemplification of "Friendship, Love and Truth," the symbols of the order.

This was followed by a vocal solo by Mr. F. Carter, who responded to an encore; a piano solo by Mrs. Fanny Jenkins, another vocal solo by Mr. Hans A. Smith, who also responded to an encore, and a selection by Long's orchestra.

Announcement was then made that arrangements for the assembly to witness the moving pictures had been made with Mr. Orr, and nearly all went below for this purpose, while the members of the lodge made preparations for the lunch of sandwiches, pickles, cake, coffee and ice cream, which was served immediately afterward.

The occasion was a very pleasant one and was much enjoyed by all those present.

Imperial English Bell Ringers.

The Imperial English hand bell ringers, vocalists and entertainers who appeared at the Opera House Tuesday evening, April 21, played to a fair-sized audience and proved to be one of the best musical treats that has ever been given in this city.

The program given under the direction of Professor W. H. Giggle, F. I. G. C. M., who has been called the Sousa of the hand bell ringers, was composed of bell ringing, glees, quartette, duet and solo singing, as well as violin solos, and was fully enjoyed by the audience, who applauded continually for encores. The entertainment complete was splendid and deserving of a much larger attendance than was present.




