The pieces played were numerous and well selected by Harry Baldwin, the leader, and several times it was necessary to repeat pieces on account of the continued applause. These concerts are certainly a credit to the town as people from near and far journeyed here Wednesday evening to listen to the music.

### Frank L. Smiths Win from Streator Reds.

A large number of loyal fans braved the chilly breezes Sunday to see the second game of the season with the Streator Reds. The game was called at 2:45 with Mickelson on the mound for Dwight. The first three men to face him were all retired at first, Boyer getting two unassisted and Nielson getting an assist on the third out. The Smiths were also retired in order, Jardine, the Reds third baseman getting one put out and two assists. Only three men faced Mickelson in the second. Dawson out on a high one to Boyer; Ira Boyer got under Hall's fly to left; Mickelson threw Patterson out at first. Flood singled in Dwight's half, the first hit of the game; Burns hit to Ryan and Flood was forced at second; Mickelson safe on Ryan's error; Fellows struck out; Lightner lined to Hall. In the third inning, with two down, Higgins singled to left, but Johnson struck out, ending the inning. The Smiths were unable to do anything in their half. In the fourth the Reds scored their first run. Schroeder struck out; Morass singled. On the hit and run play Dawson drove one between first and second that went for a single as Art Kern was running to cover second, Marass taking third on the play and scoring on Hall's fly to Lightner. Patterson popped up to Nielson. The Smiths scored their first run in the sixth on Kern's single and Boyer's three-base hit. Boyer and Flood tried the squeeze play, Higgins getting Boyer at the plate on a first play. Burns struck out ending the inning. In the seventh the home team took the lead. Mickelson hit for two bases and scored on hits by Lightner and I. Boyer. The Reds tied the score in their half of the eighth. Higgins singled; Johnson bunted toward third and quite a number of the fans thought Fellows caught the ball but Umpire Reeb said no. Johnson was thrown out at first and Higgins was caught between second and third and run down, Boyer getting the put out. Schroeder singled and Marass hit for two bases, scoring Schroeder. In the last out, Flood to Kern. In the dawn of the eighth Kern hit for two bases. Boyer hit to right field fence for three bases, scoring Kern. Flood got a Cincinnati hit, scoring Boyer, but was out at third on Burns tap to Higgins. Mickelson sacrificed, putting Burns on second. Fellows out, Jardine to Hall. The Reds were unable to score in their half and the game was won by the Smiths, 4 to 2.



The matron of honor was attired in white embroidered voile and carried carnations.


The home was beautifully decorated in blue and white with ferns and lilies of the valley.
