ROUSING RECEPTION


GIVEN COLONEL AND MRS. FRANK L. SMITH ON THEIR ARRIVAL IN DWIGHT FROM A TRIP AROUND THE WORLD.

As the 1:18 Limited train pulled in Dwight from Chicago Tuesday, August 5, a shout of joy and greeting went up from an immense crowd celebrating the home-coming of Col. and Mrs. Frank L. Smith from a trip around the world, and the Dwight band discoursed fine music.

The base ball boys and the citizens generally, large and small, male and female, joined heartily in the recep-

tion. After shaking hands with all he could reach the Colonel made a few remarks in which he thanked all for the generous demonstration of friendship; said he was pleased to get back, and that there was nothing he was more proud of than the fact that he had the respect and love of those who knew him best, in his own home.

Colonel and Mrs. Smith left Dwight for California March 8 of this year

Board of Review.

The Board of Review, composed of John Shackleton, of Cornell, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, and Chairman of the Board of Review by virtue of his office; Ed. Chalmers, of Dwight; O. N. Harwood, of Manville, and Geo. Franzen, of Fairbury, clerk, met at the town house in Dwight to listen to a large number of complaints regarding increases and inequalities in the assessments made in Dwight. It seems that some assessments were considerably more than doubled, and with the increased state tax this year, the tax would be almost three times as much as last year. These were evidently inaccuracies and the Board, having a desire to be fair with all, will undoubtedly do what is right.

We understand there were some twenty-five complaints and since it was known the Board was here people who did not look at the published list in this paper, have looked the matter up and find their assessment raised in most all cases. The personal, household goods, etc., has been doubled in many cases.

Major Judd in Wisconsin.

Major C. J. G. A. R. Veteran Succumbs from Injuries Received in Falling from Buggy.

Mr. John G. Hornberger, who was so badly injured in a road accident two weeks ago today, when he fell from his buggy while returning from his farm, died from the effects of his injuries Thursday, Aug. 7, at 12:50 p. m., at his residence on Waupansie street.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon, Aug. 10. Friends will meet at the home at 1:30 p. m., where a prayer will be given.

The funeral services will be held at the Methodist Episcopal Church at 2 p. m. The casket will be opened at the home only.

Burial will be at the German settlement cemetery.




