Henry Cooper, an old resident of Morris, engaged in the harness business, died Wednesday morning.

Peter Le Rette, an old pioneer of Grundy county, died at Joliet Wednesday at the age of 86. He came to this neighborhood 64 years ago.

A new cluster electric light was tried out quite successfully here last week, by the Public Service Co. They were successful, costless, and may be adopted.
Harry Taylor, alias Harry Sibbold, was arrested in Joliet for crooked transactions last week. His scheme was to get goods of one firm, claiming another firm wanted to borrow or buy, and then sell them himself. He got what all who do such things get.
The Bracevilles won first place in the South Wilmington base ball tournament. Flood Brothers battery, of Dwight, did the pitching and Miller, of Morris, pitched for the South Wilmington. Woods, F. Flood, Paderni, Gleghorn and Tyler made three hits each. Gutel played second for the Bracers. The Bracers also beat Coal City 12 to 4.
The appellate court at Ottawa has sustained the decision of Judge Stough in the Buren case, which will be remembered by our readers, the defendants winning. The case was entitled Gourley vs. Pierce, the first named being one of the sisters of Charles Buren, who left about 200 acres at his death near Kinsman. A brother got the fortune divided and got about \$10,000. The brother then died, and cut out the sisters in his will, and they were suing for what they claimed their rights, but evidently the law didn't agree with them, and Mr. and Mrs. Pierce and two children are the beneficiaries.

Suit for divorce was filed again this week in the circuit court by Mrs. Catherine Higgs who asks to be separated from her husband, John Higgs. The bill was filed last March but when the testimony was taken it was found that they had not been residents of the state a year. The charges are drunkenness and ill treatment. J. W. Rausch represents the complainant.
The fire department of the city of Morris has decided to secure a pulmotor for city use. There are two companies who want to sell the life savers and both have decided to give a practical demonstration of the value of their machines. The department has decided to give them both a chance and the press and the local physicians will be invited to be present when the test is made. It has not been decided yet who will be drowned and then brought back to life.
The big base ball tournament which was held at Torino Thursday, July 31, was a big success and concluded with the Braceville Blues carrying away first prize of \$125 and the Morris team getting second prize of \$75. Torino was third and received \$25 for their share. The tournament brought out some fine ball playing, but the Braceville boys with the Flood Brothers of Goodfarm township, as battery, were too strong for the other teams and defeated Torino 8 to 1 and Morris 9 to 3. Morris won from Coal City 10 to 0 and Torino defeated Coal City 1 to 0 in the best game of the four.

County Superintendent of Schools of Grundy County has issued a circular to all the schools in his district which is a resume of the teaching methods of the past, compared with the work done nowadays and calls attention to the progress being made in the Grundy schools. Twenty-five schools in the various townships have passed the examination required to permit of the school being classed as a Standard school. The schools that have passed are Districts 13, 14 and 15, Vienna township; 18, of Norman; 23, of Erlenna; 38 and 39, of Goodfarm; 46 and 47, of Mazon; 48, 49, 50 and 51, of Waupoose; 56, 57, 60 and 62, of Saratoga; 76 and 78, of Maline; 85 and 89, of Goose Lake; 61, 91, 92 and 95, of Aux Sable.

Ira Doss, the 23-year-old son of John Doss, of Morris, was arrested Saturday morning on a charge of theft and was given a hearing in the Alderford justice court and bound over to the grand jury under bonds of \$2,500 on the charge of grand larceny. He was unable to secure bail and is confined in the county jail. The boy has been working for W. R. Coop for several months and when the latter put his hand in his purse to secure \$20 that he had placed there he found the money gone and at once suspected Doss. Coop came to town and discovered that Doss had been in town the day previous and had changed a ten dollar bill in one store and had been seen with another in his possession. As he had told Coop the day before he had no money and Coop had lost two \$10 bills the latter decided to have him arrested with the result mentioned above. He confessed later.

W. E. Somerville, the Coal City aeroplane inventor, has gone to Aurora where he will bring suit against the Kopsa Air Navigation Company for failure to perform their part of a bargain entered into July 26th. The company had sent a representative to see Somerville about the purchase of the Mestach monoplane which Somerville recently purchased and placed in working order. Under terms of the contract Somerville was to demonstrate the monoplane by flying it from Chicago to Aurora and he did so, making the trip in eighteen minutes, and the price agreed upon was \$3,800. They failed to agree on the terms on delivery and Somerville ordered the machine taken home and Mestach mounted the driver's seat and flew back to Chicago in twenty minutes. The Aurora people had a machine of their own which was not a success and when they could not build a flyer they decided to buy one. Everything was all right until the time came to put up the cash and then the Aurora people fell down and could not secure the money.
