A FINE CELEBRATION

Large and Orderly Crowd--Fine Ball Game and Sports--Good Music by Band and Largely Attended Dance in the Evening

The 15th of August celebration given by the F. L. Smith Base Ball team was a decided success in every way. The weather was fine, the attractions good and the base ball game one of the best ever seen on the home diamond. Not an accident of any kind happened and the crowd was orderly and good natured from start to finish.

It was impossible to start the races advertised at eleven o'clock as there were not enough people around at that time. They were started about one o'clock on East street and immediately afterward the vaudeville shows were put on.

At two-thirty the crowd wended their way to the West Side park to witness the ball game between the F. L. Smiths and the K. C. Defenders of Cahery. Much good natured rivalry exists between these two teams as each is a fast team, and each had some games to their credit and both particularly wanted to add this one to their own list. The game was no disappointment to the large number of fans present and resulted in a victory for the home team by a score of 2 to 1.

Just before the game the 100-yd foot-race was run and was a very close one. The runners were so close together it was impossible for the spectators to tell who was ahead. Frank Flood, the popular catcher of the F. L. Smiths, won; Halm, of Gardner, was a close second, with A. H. Gleghorn, of Braceville, third.

After the ball game the streets downtown were packed with people to witness the vaudeville shows, water fight and the sparring and wrestling matches. The water fight and the wrestling

match proved to be the best attractions.

The water fight was between Pete Smith and Mr. McConnel against Martin Thompson and Chas. Bergman and resulted in a victory for the former.

The wrestling match was between Lang, of Chicago, and Nelson, of Dwight, and resulted in a draw, after a 30-minute tussle without a fall.

The sparring match was a 6 second bout between Tommp Jagre and Bully Shannon, both of Chicago. The decision was a draw.

The program of sports lasted until seven o'clock and the band concert from seven to eight. After the concert the dance at Mazon hall kept the young people until the early morning hours. The attendance at the dance far exceeded the expectations of the base ball boys and all feel well repaid for the work and worry of getting up the celebration.

Next week a detailed statement of the contributions and expenses will be published in full so that the public may see for what the money they contributed was spent.

C. N. Ewing Disappears.

C. N. Ewing, a resident of this city disappeared last Friday on his return from a business trip to Gardner and up to the present writing he has not been located. Ewing has been employed by local Agent Hodell, of the Standard Oil company in this city as a driver of one of the oil wagons. Last Friday he made one of his usual trips to Gardner with oil and supplied all of his customers at that place. He started home about the usual time and late in the afternoon Mr. Hodell was called over the phone by a farmer living south of Gardner, stating that his oil wagon with the team unhitched and tied to the wheels of the wagon were found standing alongside the highway. He immediately went to the scene and found the facts to be as stated above, and that the keys carried by Ewing were found on the cushion of the seat of the wagon. There was no trace anywhere about the wagon of Ewing or of any of his effects.

Sheriff Patterson was at once notified and after working on the case learned that Ewing had collected \$56 for oil and gasoline which he had delivered to parties in Gardner and that he had been seen later in that place having purchased a ticket from there to Chicago. Efforts are being made in that city to locate him.

New Partnership Formed.

A deal was closed this week whereby Clarence and Elwood Boyer two of Dwight's most popular and enterprising young men became partners in the garage business of George Brumbach located on the corner of Franklin and Delaware streets. The new possessors have been employed by Mr. Brumbach for the past year and are familiar with the business they are now connected with.

The work is to be started at once and the new building which will be 50 ft wide and 130 ft long is to be completed by the last of November.

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
