FAKER AT WORK IN THIS CITY.

Circulars Sent Out Causes His Arrest.

R. H. Murray, who also travels under the alias of R. C. Clark, was arrested in this city last Saturday evening by Chief of Police Hanson on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, and was taken to the county jail in Pontiac later in the evening.

Murray has been sought for some time by the publishers of the American Lumberman, with offices in Chicago. The American Lumberman is a trade paper with a circulation among lumber dealers and allied trades. Murray is charged with calling on these dealers in Wisconsin and Illinois, soliciting subscriptions at \$3 a year, whereas the usual rate is \$4. The publishers have been searching for him for some time, and from circulars sent out by them the arrest was made.

The treasurer and the attorney of the company publishing the Lumberman arrived in Pontiac Monday morning in response to a telegram from Sheriff Patterson telling of the arrest and held a long consultation with the sheriff and Murray, which resulted in the charges in this county being dropped and the return to Chicago of Murray and the two officers of the company Monday afternoon. It is said that Murray has agreed to make good all of the losses of the company which he has caused and that in consideration thereof the company will not prosecute him.

PARTY HAVE NARROW ESCAPE.

Front Axle Breaks on Car While Returning from Gardner.

John Hayes while driving a load home from Gardner in his automobile Wednesday evening had an experience that he would not want to have repeated. He was driving along about 25 to 30 miles an hour when the front axle on his machine broke, throwing one of the front wheels off and leaving the front of the car crash to the ground. He immediately applied the emergency brake, but before the machine could be stopped the front fender was damaged and the parties in the car were all given a thorough shaking up.
