### FUNERAL OF WILLIAM TOCK.

Services Held Sunday Over the Remains of Man Killed in Accident.

The funeral services of Mr. William Tock, who was killed last week in the terrible automobile accident, was held last Sunday, Oct. 5, at his late home on West Delaware street.

A large number of friends were present at the last rites and many beautiful floral tokens were sent, completely covering the casket.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Kistemann, pastor of the German Lutheran Church, who after a short sermon, read the following obituary:

William John Tock was born Feb. 14, 1857, in Ritzrow, near Stavenhagen, Germany. He was the oldest son of Joachinn Tock and Frederice Nienhardt, his wife. He was united in marriage to Miss Minnie Schnett, and from this union were born ten children, four sons and six daughters. Eight children survive their father. He is mourned by his widow, eight children, two sons-in-law, five grand children, three brothers, and one sister. He died Oct. 3, 1913, early in the morning. He attained an age of 56 years, 8 months and 19 days.

After the services the body was taken to Oak Lawn cemetery for burial.
