**DWIGHT MAN ARRESTED.**

Caught Robbing Alton Freight Cars in Joliet Yards.

Frank Tingle, giving his residence as Dwight, employed on the Alton as a locomotive fireman, and Frank Callahan, alias Fred Smith, an Alton engineer, were arrested in Joliet Sunday charged with a number of freight car robberies.

Both were caught red handed Sunday afternoon by Chicago & Alton detectives. Callahan and Tingle have been employed by the Alton for many years and were on duty Sunday when arrested.

With their arrest a mystery surrounding the almost weekly thefts of valuable goods from Alton merchandise cars is cleared, say the detectives.

According to the railroad detectives for the past several months two local freight cars operated between Chicago and Dwight have been robbed almost every Saturday or Sunday while in the Joliet yards.

Sunday afternoon the detectives heard a switch engine operating in the South Joliet yards. Toward evening the engine was stopped near the cars. Shortly afterward they heard the men forcing the car door. They were working on the car next to the one in which the detectives were.

By prying off a car window the detectives saw Callahan and Tingle force the door in such a manner as not to break the car seal. They also saw them take from the car several packages and hide them in the engine cab.

The goods, which consisted of several dozen shirts, two boxes of socks and other articles, were taken from the engine cab when the engine was taken to the roundhouse. The police were called and Callahan and Tingle were arrested.


