## LINCOLN'S GETTYSBURG ADDRESS.

"Four-score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

"Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation or any nation so conceived and so dedicated can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as the final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that Nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

"But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate—we cannot consecrate—we cannot hallow—this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The World will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us, that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion; that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this Nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom; and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the Earth."

### A Gallery Tour.

Lovers of art have been much interested in reading the various criticisms and appreciations of the Twenty-sixth Annual Exhibition of American Paintings and Sculpture now in the Art Institute in Chicago.

The Fine Arts Club of Dwight, Illinois, numbering more than thirty members, enjoyed on Monday afternoon, the seventeenth instant, the rare treat of being personally conducted by Mr. Dudley Crats Watson, through the galleries where these works are being exhibited. Mr. Watson, who has charge of their art course this winter, confined his lecture to a consideration of the merits of such of the paintings as have been awarded prizes, medals or honorable mention. Being an artist and an instructor at the Art Institute, he has an esoteric knowledge of his subject. It is a joy to listen to him; as one member remarked "The best part of it all was Mr. Watson himself." He speaks feelingly and generously, but always with discrimination. Mr. Watson hopes to have the Club repeat their visit to the Institute at the close of the course, when he feels sure much progress in appreciation will be realized.

### Obituary of Ole Larsen.

Ole Larsen was born in Labro, Denmark, June 28, 1885. He came to America in 1902 and remained till 1909 when he returned to Denmark. In 1910 he was married to Miss Kristine Paulsen, and in 1911, with his wife, came again to this country, and has made his home here since.

His final illness began about three months ago when he was taken to a hospital in Streator, where he passed away at 1:25 p. m. Wednesday, Nov. 19. He leaves to mourn him a wife, and two children, Edith and Edna, his old parents, who live in Denmark, a brother, Andreas Larsen, of Mae, Neb., and many friends.

Mr. Larsen belonged to the Danish Lutheran Church. He was a member of the Danish Brotherhood of America and the local camp of Odd Fellows. His funeral was held from the Danish Lutheran Church in Dwight at 1:30 p. m. Friday, Rev. Aaberg officiating and burial was at Oak Lawn cemetery.

Mr. Larsen was a quiet, unassuming and very congenial man, well liked and respected by all that knew him. May he rest in peace and may God comfort his young widow and two small children in their heavy loss of a good and kind husband and father.

### The "Williamsport Plan."

At an unofficial meeting of the Board and a few other members of the Commercial Club Thursday evening, a brief outline of the mechanism and operative details of the "Williamsport Plan" were put before the meeting by S. Fred Cummings.

The above "Plan" is one whereby the business men of any town may, by a combination of voluntary loans of a certain part of their "Bank Credit" (not cash), deposit this combined "Credit" with any bank or banks and loan money therefrom to reputable manufacturing institutions desiring locations where these institutions have sufficient funds or marketable property of their own, to "Match Dollars" so to speak, with this "Credit Combine."

The officials of the "Plan" hold the property of the borrowing institution as security for the members of the "Credit Combine," the bank or banks hold the individual members of the "Credit Combine" as security for the money furnished and the borrowing institution pays the interest on this money to the bank, so that the members of the "Credit Combine," so long as the borrowing institution "Makes Good," never hear of nor are troubled in any way by any feature of the transaction.

This "Plan" has been in operation since 1900 and has proven a success wherever tried. Possibly the time is close at hand when Dwight should look further into this matter with a view of adoption.

At this meeting action was taken requesting the Board of Managers of the Commercial Club to take this matter under consideration and try and devise some means whereby inquiries from manufacturing concerns desiring locations could be investigated.

### Dwight Gun Club Shoot.
