## FROM PONTIAC

FLORENCE SULLIVAN VISITS PONTIAC—HOWARD SCHOTT HAS ACCIDENT—PONTIAC DEFEATS STREATOR AT FOOT BALL—DR. MARSHALL TRIAL STILL GOING ON.

Rev. Dean Sumner, of Chicago, closed the addresses at the institute Friday, and it closed all agreeing it was one of the best ever held in the county.

The anniversary of the Lincoln Gettysburg speech was duly celebrated here, delegations from the G. A. R. visiting all the schools, and by special programs arranged for the occasion.

The trial of Dr. Marshall drags on, the prosecution has had nearly all the boys who rather lie than eat on the stand. The very worst element in the reformatory and outside have been picked out for the occasion. Captain H. M. Luke, who resigned a short time ago on account of ill health is at his daughter's home in Glendive, Mt. His daughter writes:

Father is very sick and is here with us. He was in bed ill last week and is unable to write. Naturally it is hard for him to bear, that he can't take part in this rumpus enough to refute some of the lies that have been published wholesale.

Although his name has not been widely mentioned, nearly all of these untrue criticisms (if I may use so mild a term) are about matters which were entirely under his department, and it seems a shame that the work of a man who has striven with all his heart to use his years of experience to better conditions in that institution, should have it so grossly misrepresented to the public at the time that it was necessary for him to lay it down.

He says that, knowing the personnel of the inmates as he did, the investigating committee picked out largely the worst class of boys to testify—boys who would rather lie than tell the truth, and glory in what they could accomplish in that line.

Others were little fellows who were undoubtedly well coached as to what they should say, and little did the investigating committee care for the testimony of men who were honorable and honest citizens.

Of course I understand that it was merely a plan of dirty politics in order to fire the men working under civil service laws, and it seems a shame that the truth has been so slow in coming out, largely, I think, on account of the unfortunate stand of the last superintendent and my father's illness.

Illinois has an institution to be proud of; handled and run as wisely and well as it was possible for one of that kind—at least until the time that Florence Sullivan was allowed to go

there and act so unwisely, for the good of the place, at least.

I hope that the women of Illinois will show that they stand for clean politics at the next election, for I am afraid that poor old Illinois needs cleaning.

It is enough to make any one furious to think of the absolute lies that have been published about the brutality to the boys. It seems as though the truth must come out and be published so that the public should know. Dr. Marshall's trial will do this, in part at least, if it is conducted at all honestly.
