




Most people wait until spring before they think of starting the garden, but really the garden can best be started in the fall. A heavy coating of manure plowed under in the fall does more good than if plowed under in the spring. There is also more benefit from deep plowing in the fall than in the spring. A. L. Robison, of Pekin, follows the practice of plowing the garden in the fall and preparing part of it at once for seeding. He sows the lettuce and onion seed now and these come up just as soon as there is growing weather in the spring and get a much better start than they would otherwise have. A farm garden needs to be given every possible advantage, for it may be made a great source of profit, in fact, greater than any like acreage on the farm. Fall garden work as suggested is well worth while.

"We are just eaten up with mice," said a housekeeper the other day. The mice are smart enough; when it gets near winter they move to the buildings, corn shocks, fences, etc., and prepare winter quarters for themselves. Every fall it happens that the dwelling that has had no trouble with mice during the summer has an extra supply on hand to the dismay of the housekeeper. A simple way to rid the place of them is to get a box ten or twelve inches square and four inches deep. Place in it about an inch of fresh corn meal, and in each of opposite corners place a couple of those five cent mouse traps, with the trigger toward the corner. Place the box anywhere signs of mice are seen, and take them out as fast as they are caught. They will not fall to play in the meal, and the purpose of the box is to prevent their getting away with the traps. This method has never been known to fail to rid a house of all the mice in a very short time.
