After this return it will be for a full year with \$1000 for a married man and \$3000 for a single one.

Remember these reports must be in before March 1 and there is a fine if not, and a much larger one for a false report.

Why are jewels used in a watch? Do they add anything to its time keeping qualities?

Jewels are used as pivot bearings. A metal bearing would wear rapidly, and the resulting friction would impair the time keeping qualities of a watch. The jewels, being hard, show no appreciable wear. The most expensive watches have diamonds for bearings, which add to the cost. Most watches have rubies and sapphires.

When did Woodrow Wilson cease to be governor of New Jersey? His resignation took effect March 1.

Will you tell me what system the government uses in placing buoys?

According to the system of buoyage adopted in the United States waters, red buoys with even numbers will be found on the starboard side of the channel in approaching from seaward and must be left on the starboard side when passing in. Red and black horizontal striped buoys will be found on either side, and may be left on either hand when passing in. White and black perpendicular striped buoys will be found in midchannel and must be passed close to avoid danger.

Perches with balls, cages, etc., when placed on buoys, will be at turning points, the color and number indicating on which side they shall be passed.

Principal channels are marked by nun buoys, secondary channels by can buoys and minor channels by spar buoys.

What is the meaning of the slang phrase "The dickens"?

It is a corruption of "devil." Shakespeare in "The Merry Wives of Windsor," act 3, scene 2, uses it in the sentence, "I cannot tell what the dickens his name is."

What is meerschm, and where is it obtained?

Meerschm is an opaque mineral of gray, white or cream color, occurring in stratified earthy or alluvial deposits. Most of that obtained in commerce comes from the plain of Esk-Shehr, in Asia Minor. In that district there are said to be 4,000 shafts leading to horizontal galleries for extraction of the meerschm. When first extracted it is soft and hardens when exposed to the heat of the sun. It is also found at Thebes, in Greece, and near Kroman, in Moravia. Some deposits have been found at Nottingham, Pa., and in South Carolina and Utah.

Was a negro ever a United States senator, and how many colored congressmen have there been?

Blanche K. Bruce, educated at Oberlin college and a planter in Mississippi, was United States senator from that state from 1875 to 1879. P. B. S. Pinchback was elected senator from Louisiana in 1873, but was never seated, though he received regular pay and mileage. Altogether there have been nearly twenty negro representatives in the lower branch of congress since the civil war, though none recently.

Is there any reason why a statue of Robert E. Lee should not be erected in Washington?

Nothing stands in its way. In August, 1910, President Taft approved the attorney general's decision that Virginia might place in Statuary hall in the capitol a statue of Lee in Confederate uniform.

Who are the Mayo brothers, surgeons?

Dr. Charles Horace Mayo and Dr. William James Mayo, known to the world as the Mayo brothers of Rochester, Minn., have been called the surgeons' surgeons because so many of their own profession come to them for instruction and treatment. In the twenty years that they have been surgeons at St. Mary's hospital, Rochester, more than 33,000 people afflicted with disease have been treated. In 1909 they are said to have operated in 1,825 cases of appendicitis and 1,484 abdominal cases, losing only twenty-three patients.

What do the terms effendi and pasha mean when attached to the names of Turkish officials?

Effendi is simply a title of respect or courtesy, about like our honorable. Pasha is a title of higher rank, either civil or military.

Who was the last representative of the royal Stuart family? Are there any living today who are legitimately descended from Charles I. in direct line?

The last of the Stuarts was Henry Benedict Stuart (1725-1807), Cardinal York, a grandson of James II. of England and brother of Charles Edward, the young pretender. He died at Rome, and with him the line of the Stuarts became extinct.

Did the constitution of the United States prior to the civil war declare or assert all states in the Union to be free and independent—if not in so many words, at least in substance?

No provision in the constitution or elsewhere in the law was ever made previous to the civil war explicitly forbidding any state to dissolve its bond with the Union. The action of Jackson in the nullification times, however, being approved, set an administrative if not a legal precedent against secession, which was more than an abstract proposition.
