The "schools of instruction" for women seem to have been well-conducted, as there were very few votes thrown out.

The next is the Board of Education election, and then the Village election. The result this time settles the license question for two years.

The Republican ticket won all the way through with large majorities in most cases.

Automobiles were kept busy all day Tuesday, carrying voters to and from the polls.

Among the women voters was Mrs. Emily Empie, who will be 88 years old the 18th day of May. Although a number of women in the "eighties" voted, Mrs. Empie carries the palm as being the oldest woman voter in Dwight on last Tuesday.

LIVINGSTON COUNTY RESULTS.

In Pontiac township the entire Republican ticket was elected with the exception of supervisor, J. W. Hoover being re-elected to that office by a majority of 607. The wet vote was 1163 and the dry vote 1912.

Board of Supervisors.

Politically the new board of supervisors, with those chosen at Tuesday's election, will stand fifteen Democrats, fourteen Republicans and three Progressives. The Progressives are holdovers, while of the fifteen elected Tuesday ten are Democrats and five Republicans.

The result of the wet and dry campaign in Livingston county was decided in favor of the drys in every township where the question was voted upon with the exception of Culom where the wets won out with a small majority. This is now the only wet town in the county. Odell went dry by 153. Campus went dry by a majority of 30.

GRUNDY COUNTY.

Out of a total of 2261 votes cast in Morris, the wets won by a majority of 139.

Gardner remains wet by eleven votes.

Braceville township went wet by nearly two to one. Felix township also remains wet.

Goodfarm was carried by the drys with a majority of forty-one votes. Seneca had a 289 dry majority. Erienna, Marseilles and Channahon are listed in the dry column.

Braceville and Greenfield townships each elected women for tax collector. On the township officers throughout the county the Republicans seem to have won out in most of the cases, in some of the towns electing the entire ticket and in others electing all but one or two officers.

RESULTS THROUGHOUT THE STATE

Returns show that the suffrage vote in Tuesday's election drove out 1100 saloons in Illinois and added many cities to the dry list.

Sixteen new counties are claimed by the drys, making forty-six now without saloons.

Decatur, Bloomington and Galesburg went dry, while Joliet and Springfield were given good majorities on the wet side.

Rockford, which has been dry for four years, was kept in that column by the women.

The Civic Federation Platform.

We, the Civic Federation of Dwight, hereby make statement of the principles upon which our candidates for village offices stand and upon which we ask the citizens to support our candidates.

1. We stand for the enforcement of law. The question of saloons or no saloons has been settled by the people. We expect to abide by their decision. If during the time any of these candidates hold office the question should be decided otherwise, they and each of them will be in favor of law enforcement also. In all cases the candidates are against the illegal selling of liquor.

2. We favor a business administration; the careful handling of village funds; the full publication of the proceedings of the board including an itemized account of all receipts and disbursements, and twice a year a balance showing the exact condition of the finances of the village. We believe in a progressive town but are against wastefulness and extravagance.

3. We favor the enactment of such ordinances as will make it possible to enforce the laws, and we pledge ourselves to work for the moral betterment of the village.

4. Our Federation pledges itself to support our candidates in all their efforts for civic betterment.


