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VILLAGE ELECTION.

A Majority of the Civic Federation Ticket Wins—Gus Ohlendorf Wins on the Business Men's Ticket.

The election for trustees and clerk of Dwight village was a spirited one from start to finish, and the result was in doubt up to the time the votes were counted. Neither side can be accused of sleeping at the post.

It is the opinion that having a mixed board will not be a bad thing for the peoples' interests, because all interests are represented, and all should be satisfied.

It is reported that most of the saloon keepers will run soft drink parlors and remain in Dwight prepared to fight it out again two years from now. This is a rumor only.

There are many things which are surprising to many, one of which is that as far as the license end is concerned they carried it by an average majority of men's votes of about 40, so that the same as in the township fight the women saved the anti-license ticket again.

From 7 o'clock to 5 p. m. automobiles and workers were flying around town to get the voters out and the result was that there were 1098 ballots cast.

The women cast 512 ballots with only two thrown out.

The men cast 586 with three thrown out.

This shows that all were pretty well posted.

As usual R. D. Gregg ran well. He is popular with the people and a good man no matter where you put him.

The candidates are all good men, and no one need feel badly for having been beaten.

The election is now over and the prospects are bright for a good business administration. The board should get together on business propositions to raise money, to make good the loss of the license money, and on things for an economic administration, and the people should stand by them to the limit.

There is nothing in fighting the war over again and we believe both sides will uphold the law and do the best they can for the city.

Pontiac Election.

The city election Tuesday resulted in the election of three Republican alderman, one Progressive, and one Independent and Chas. N. Patty, Republican candidate, for police magistrate. The total men's vote was 1341 and the women's vote, 1316. C. N. Patty, R., won over Hugh Thompson, D., by a majority of 489. The new council on organization will be composed of eight Republicans, one Progressive, and one Independent with a Republican mayor. The following is the results by wards: First ward, W. H. Bentley, R.; Second ward, Wm. F. Devoe, R.; Third ward, A. R. Hoke, P.; Fourth ward, Howard J. Legg, R.; Fifth ward, E. A. Thayer, Ind.

Other Elections.

The entire anti-license ticket or citizens ticket was elected in Odell Tuesday with the exception of village clerk which was won by a candidate on the People's ticket.

The proposition to annex additional territory to the village of Emington created more interest at Tuesday's election than did the election of town officers. The proposition lost by a big majority. There was but one ticket in the field for town officers, the following being the results: Anti-license

Trustees: E. M. Herb, 26; J. B. Watts, 28; Edward Vant, 13. The village did not elect a clerk this year.

The village election at Cullom Tuesday passed off very quietly. The following are the results: People's ticket—Trustee: F. W. Kingdon, men 115, women 48; C. G. Gassler, men 109, women 36; Martin Detwiller, men 115, women 48. The name of Joe Lelsierowitz was written in on the ballot, he receiving 4 men's votes and 8 women's votes. Village clerk: A. F. Eldridge, men 14, women 45. There was no candidate for the office of police magistrate.

The following are the results in the village election held at Chatsworth: United Citizens—Trustees: Chas. Roberts, men 181, women 150; T. E. Burns, men 136, women 124; James Baldwin, men 122, women 117. Clerk: H. T. Klover, men 155, women 140. People's—Trustees: A. J. Sneyd, men 103, women 92; A. Cording, men 140, women 135; Elon Steer, men 130, women 133. Clerk: B. P. Carney, men 118, women 114.

Streator's city election resulted in the election of six Republican aldermen. In the first ward there was no Republican candidate and Frank Comfort, a Democratic candidate, was elected. The entire Progressive ticket was defeated by an overwhelming majority.

Golf Grounds.

The grounds on the old home Vickery farm west of Dwight, which the Golf Club has rented is undergoing almost a complete change. It is being leveled and rolled by one of the immense rollers like the contractors used on the paved streets, and otherwise greatly improved for sport. The grounds will eventually be one of the best in the country.

The membership at the present time is about thirty, but will increase greatly when it is known and appreciated what splendid exercise it is for all who are engaged in inside work.

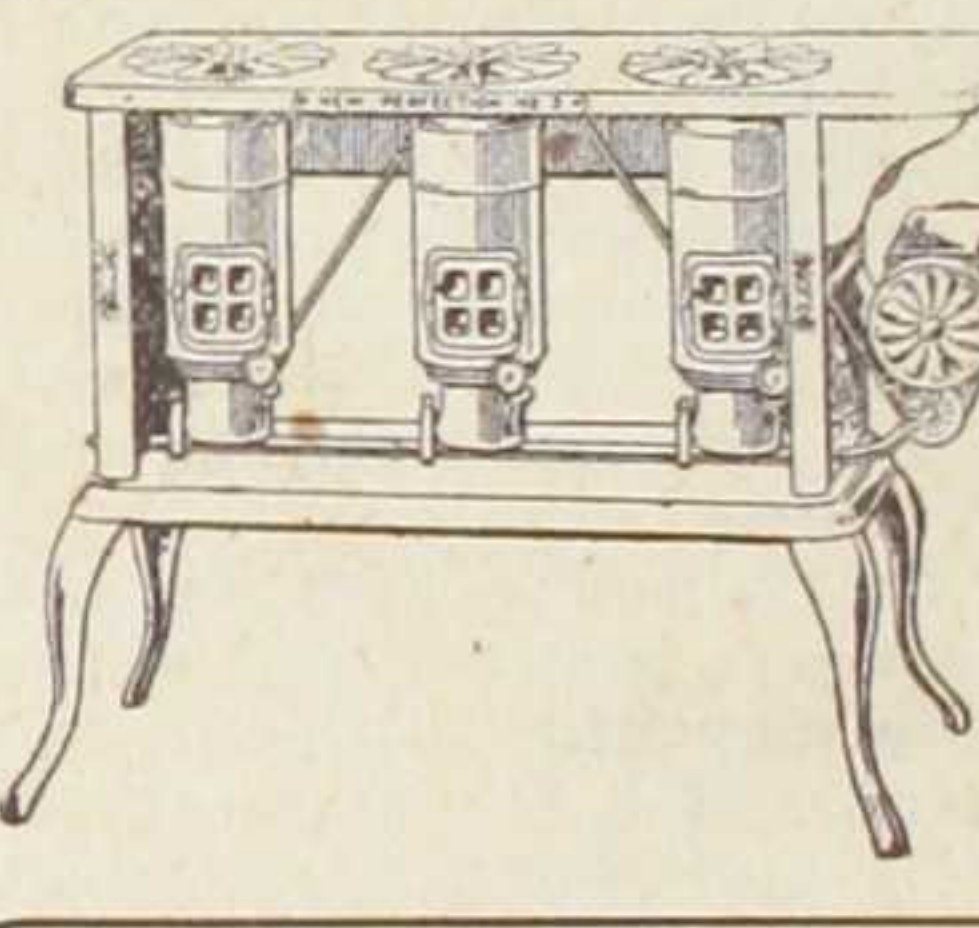


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
