FROM PONTIAC

MIDGETS DEFEAT BLOOMINGTON—SUTHERLAND, ANDREWS, AND MRS. ESTELLE GRITTON PASS AWAY—FRANK J. BUTLER ENTERTAINS—EPWORTH LEAGUE MET TUESDAY.

Myers, of Forrest, came to Pontiac Monday morning to hold the inquest. Estelle V. Sandy was born in the state of Virginia. She was united in marriage in that state to J. Davis. Following his death Mrs. Davis came to Illinois and had made her home here for a number of years. She was united in marriage to Charles Gritton in this city December 1, 1913. He, with her daughter, a sister, Mrs. Robert Carter, of this city, and two brothers and a sister in Virginia, survive her.

At the family residence of Mr. and Mrs. William Sutherland, at 6:30 o'clock Sunday evening, occurred the quiet home wedding of their daughter, Miss Florence, to LaMont Andrews, of Panola, by Rev. W. Mrs. Andrews is the oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland and was employed by the Pontiac Shoe Manufacturing Company. She is a popular young lady and her many friends wish her much joy in her future life. Mr. Andrews is the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Andrews, of Panola. Mr. and Mrs. Andrews left on the Hummer for Gridley, where they will make their home on a farm.

The Midgets are back in form again and showed their class by defeating the fast Costello and O'Malley team from Bloomington by a score of 9 to 1 at the west side gall park Sunday. This is the first time the Midgets have taken this team to such a defeat in two years. C. Jobst did the slab work for the Midgets and worked like a big leaguer. She leaves, besides her husband, her father and mother, a sister, Loretta, and a brother, James, all residing in Cullom.
