## FROM MORRIS

**MORRIS ATTORNEYS ATTEND BAR ASSOCIATION — ED MASON GETS NEW POSITION — HARRY BROWN MEETS WITH ACCIDENT — BOARD OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS MEET.**

Ed. Mason, of Morris, conductor on the C. O. & P. Ry., was last Friday elected general vice president at the national convention of interurban trainmen held at St. Louis. Mr. Mason has already filled the office of state vice president.

Willis and Joe Frank and plead guilty to disorderly conduct without any hesitation. A fine of \$10 and costs was assessed on each of them and they went back to the county jail.

The Will County Bar Association entertained the Justices of the Supreme Court of Illinois Saturday evening and about 200 lawyers and others sat to a banquet at the Country Club. Chief Justices Cooke, Carter, Cartwright, Dunn and Vickers were present. Craig and Farmer were absent. The board of local improvements Tuesday discussed the third ward sewer project and have changed the old plans. Some of the route has been eliminated. In the new plan the sewer will begin at the north end of the trunk line from Pine to Main, north on Pine to Jackson, east on Jackson to Spruce. The matter will be presented to the council for approval after the public hearing which has been set for May 29 at 9 a. m. in the city council room. The estimated cost complete is placed at \$41,660.17.

### FROM THE COUNTY.

Objections to the taxes levied on the Santa Fe road in Grundy county have been filed in the county court. Robert Dunlap and Judge Huston represent the petitioner.

The hearing in the Goose Lake election contest matter was not held Monday in the county court but has been postponed to Monday, May 25. Attorney Hayes is busy with the grand jury and in the circuit for at least a week and on this account a postponement was made.

The will of the late William Alexander Simpson, of Braceville, was admitted to probate Tuesday. Flora Wheatley is the administrator. One of the witnesses to the will was Rev. Walter J. Ward, who is now in Phillipsburg, Kan., and it was necessary to send there and get depositions before the will could be admitted.

County Clerk G. W. Anderson has received a program of the 28th annual convention of supervisors, county commissioners and county clerks which will be held in Peoria on August 4, 5 and 6. Governor Dunne will deliver an address on the closing day. The program for three days is full of good things both instructive and entertaining. The convention was held in Morris last October 28, 29 and 30.

Clarence Wildey, who resides on a farm in Erienna township, met with quite a misfortune Wednesday night. About a quarter to six he was going between two mules in the barn to feed them. One of the animals kicked him and the blow knocked him under the

other one which trampled on him. Dr. Palmer was called and he found no internal injuries but Mr. Wildey is badly bruised and will be confined to his bed for a few days.

Two Knights of the Road, foreign extraction, are in the county jail awaiting a hearing Wednesday on complaint of the farming community north of us. They were pan handling the houses for food and when they found the women folks alone, the men being in the fields, the beggars became insulting and angry if their demands were refused. This happened at several places. The sheriff's office was notified and the two were gathered in by Deputy Oscar Francis.

The Carson House for the second time this month has again changed hands and is now owned by John Moris and P. T. Mead, both of Sandwich, Ill., who have bought the interests of Ernest Grenier and taken possession. Mr. Grenier has been owner since May first and has spent most of the time since then in putting the place into condition to operate a first-class hotel. He has done this but it is said was not in accord with the bar end of the place. He purchased the interests of Mrs. Hattie Goldman, who with her husband, had conducted the hotel about a year, when the saloon license was revoked and issued May 1st to Mr. Grenier. The new proprietors have had over twenty years experience in the hotel business and will try to make a success of this one. The firm will be known as Morris & Mead.
