CHAPTER NO. 204.

An Ordinance creating a Board of Health in and for the Village of Dwight, County of Livingston, State of Illinois, prescribing the duties and powers of said Board and certain regulations and provisions pertaining to the health and sanitary conditions in said Village.

Be It ordained by the President and Members of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight, County of Livingston, State of Illinois:

Section I.—That a Board of Health, to consist of three members, in and for the Village of Dwight, Livingston County, Illinois, be and the same is hereby created. The said Board shall consist of Three members to be appointed by the President of the Village of Dwight with and by the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village. After the appointment of the members of said Board of Health, they shall elect one of their number as Chairman of said Board and another as Secretary of said Board. The term of office of said members of the Board of Health shall be for the municipal year ending in April or until their successors are appointed. The compensation of the members of the Board of Health shall be fixed by the Board of Trustees at the end of each municipal year. One of the members of said Board of Health shall be a resident physician and in the regular practice of his profession.

Section II.—Powers and Duties.—The Board of Health shall exercise a general supervision over the sanitary affairs of the Village and shall have the following general powers:

- (1) To order abatement of all nuisances, public or private, tending in the opinion of the Board, to promote disease, and to employ if necessary, scavengers for that purpose.
- (2) To prevent, in such manner as they may deem advisable, the introduction of contagious diseases.
- (3) To care for any and all persons having contagious diseases, unless otherwise provided for.
- (4) To examine all infected houses, buildings, dwelling outhouses and other premises.
- (5) To notify all persons, upon whose premises, or the premises occupied by them, the said Board of Health shall find any nuisance or condition of things dangerous to the health of the inhabitants thereof, to remove the same forthwith, and in case of neglect or refusal so to do, said Board of Health are hereby empowered to take such measures for such removal or suppression, and for the cleansing and renovation of said premises, as said Board may deem advisable.
- (6) That the said Board of Health is hereby empowered to quarantine any house or household, or other public or private place or dwelling wherein small pox, cholera, yellow fever, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, chicken pox, and other infectious and contagious diseases exists or has so recently existed as to be a menace to health.
- (7) To adopt and enforce all restrictions or measures deemed advisable, and to make and publish rules and regulations necessary or proper to carry into effect the powers given to said Board of Health by this ordinance or to promote the objects of the organization.

Section III.—Enforcement of Board's Orders.—Any person or persons, company or corporation, who shall fail or refuse to comply with any order or direction of said Board of Health shall upon conviction, be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100) for each offense to be recoverable in any court having proper jurisdiction.

Section IV.—Health Regulations.—(1) If any building or premises in said Village shall become in such condition as to be injurious to the health or dangerous to the lives of the occupants or public, it shall be the duty of said Board of Health to make an examination of the same and to direct and instruct as to the remedy for such condition; and if the same be not remedied within a reasonable time, the Board shall thereupon cause such building or premises to be put in safe and sanitary condition, and the cost thereof shall be charged to the person or persons responsible for or causing such unhealthy condition.

- (2) No person shall deposit or leave any offal, garbage, night soil, or refuse of any description upon any street, alley, vacant lot or public grounds within the Village except by direction or written permission of the Board of Health. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be given twenty-four hours notice to remove the same, and if not removed within that time, the person so depositing or leaving the same shall be liable for the cost of removal and shall also, upon conviction, be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100).
- (3) Any person who shall throw or deposit any offal or other offensive matter or the carcass of any animal in any water course, pond, spring, well or sewer, or who shall throw anything in any stream of water in said Village which will obstruct the flow of water or cause the water to become stagnant, shall, upon conviction be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100) for each offense.
- (4) No privy, water closet, nor cess pool nor reservoir into which a privy vault, water closet, stable or sink is drained, shall be dug and used on premises where new buildings are being built, or hereafter upon any other premises, within one hundred feet of any well or spring used as the source of water supply for drinking or culinary purposes. Every person on whose premises a privy vault, water closet, and such cess pool or reservoir above mentioned, now exists and is used, or may hereafter be built, constructed and used on their premises, shall clean and remove the contents of the same at least once in each year before the first day of May thereof, and each person in cleansing such privies, vaults, water closets, cess pools and reservoirs mentioned shall not bury or cover up on their premises the contents thereof but shall have the same removed from the premises.
- (5) Every physician or other attendant shall report in writing to the Board of Health the name of every patient he or she shall have who are affected with small pox, cholera, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, chicken pox and other infectious or contagious diseases that may hereafter be publicly declared by the Board of Health to be dangerous

to the public health, together with the precise locality where such patient may be found, and such report shall be made within twelve hours after the first visit of such physician or attendant upon such person. All directions which the Board of Health shall prescribe for the purpose of preventing the spread of any disease, either by the use of disinfectants, fumigation or otherwise, shall be strictly carried out, and any order that may be made by the Board of Health for the destruction of clothing or other articles for the purpose aforesaid shall be promptly obeyed. Any person or persons failing to comply with these provisions, shall upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100) for each offense.

- (6) That whenever it shall be deemed necessary by the Board of Health to establish the true character of any disease, which they believe to be communicable, a medical examination of the person or persons affected by such disease may be ordered, and such examination shall be permitted by all attendants and persons. Any person or persons offending against the provision of this section shall be fined upon conviction not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100), for each offense.
- (7) No principal, teacher, superintendent of any school, and no parent or guardian of any child attending school, shall permit any child sick with any disease mentioned in this ordinance, or with any other contagious or infectious disease, or any child residing in any house in which such disease exists, to attend any school until such time as the attending physician certifies and the Board of Health approves that it can be done without danger of communicating the disease to others. Any person or persons violating this section shall, upon conviction be fined in the sum of not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100) for each offense.
- (8) The rules and regulations of the State Board of Health of the State of Illinois concerning all contagious and infectious diseases shall be enforced by the Board of Health of this Village together with such other reasonable regulations as may be ordered by the Board of Health of this Village and which are not in conflict with the regulations of said State Board of Health, and all public officers of this Village in their proper capacity are hereby commanded to assist the Board of Health in enforcing said regulations.

Section V.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, company or corporation to suffer or permit or have upon their premises, whether owned or leased by them, any one or more of the following unsanitary fly-producing, disease causing conditions, to wit:

- (1) Animal manure in any quantity which is not securely protected from flies; (2) privies, vaults, cess pools, pits and like places which are not securely protected from flies; (3) garbage in any quantity which is not securely protected from flies; (4) trash, litter, rags or anything whatsoever in which flies may breed or multiply.

Upon knowledge coming to the Board of Health or other officers of the Village that any person or persons, company or corporation, is allowing any of the above specified conditions to exist on the premises occupied by them, such Board or officer shall thereupon notify such person, company or corporation to remove or abate said conditions within twenty-four hours after the receipt of said notice. In the event of the refusal or neglect of such person, company or corporation to so abate or remove such condition or conditions within the time prescribed in said notice, such person, company or corporation shall upon conviction, be fined in the sum of not less than ten dollars (\$10), nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100) for each twenty-four hours or fraction thereof that he, she or they allow said condition or conditions to exist after the receipt of said notice.

Section VI.—All fines and penalties herein provided by this ordinance shall be recoverable before any court of competent jurisdiction.

Section VII.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section VIII.—This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after the date of its passage and due publication according to the statute in such case made and provided.

CHAPTER NO. 205.

An Ordinance defining the Fire Limits of the Village of Dwight, Illinois, and provide for the protection against fires and providing for penalties for violation thereof.

Be It ordained by the Village Board of the Village of Dwight, Illinois:

Section I.—The fire limits of the Village of Dwight, Illinois, shall consist of all that portion of said Village embraced within the following limits, to-wit: Beginning at the corner of East Chippewa Street and Franklin Street, North to the alley between Lots 3 and 4, in Block (17) of the original Town, thence East to the line between Lots 2 and 3, Block (4) Rutzers Addition, thence due North through Blocks 3 and 4, Rutzers Addition and Block (11) in Spencer's Addition, to the alley in said Block (11). Thence West to the line between Lots 22 and 23 in Block (10) of the original Town, thence South to Mazon Avenue, thence West to Prairie Avenue, South on Prairie Avenue to the alley between Lots 2 and 30 in Block 22 of the original Town, thence East to the South line between Lots 7 and 8 in Block (23), thence North to Chippewa Street, thence East to the place of beginning.

Section II.—No building, shed, stable, barn feed yard, or outbuilding of any description whatsoever, or any part of any such building, shed, stable, barn, feed yard, or outbuilding of any description whatsoever shall be erected within the fire limits, unless all the outside walls or party walls thereof shall be built of stone, brick, or other fire proof material; and all the wooden joists, beams or other timbers placed on the outside or party walls shall be

separated from each other at least four inches, with stone or brick well laid in mortar; and all wooden lintels or plate pieces placed in front, rear or side wall, shall recede from the outside of the wall at least four inches; or when they shall not so recede, shall be covered with fire proof material. All outside, end and party walls, of any brick or other fire proof building shall extend above the roof of such building eighteen inches, and the planking or sheeting of any such roof shall not extend across the fire wall of such building, shed, stable, barn, feed yard or other outbuilding of any description whatsoever.

Section III.—All roofs and gutters hereafter placed on any brick or other fire proof building, shed, stable, barn, feed yard or other outbuilding of any description whatsoever, already erected or to be erected, within the fire limits, shall be covered on the outside surface with copper, tin, iron or other fire proof material; and all wooden cornices placed upon any such building shall be covered with like fire proof material and shall be separated from the wooden cornices or any other wooden part of any adjacent structure by brick or other fire proof partition at least four inches; and of the outer timbers or wood work of any such structure shall not connect with any of the interior timbers or woodwork.

Section IV.—No such wooden structure or any part of such wooden structure within the fire limits, shall be raised, repaired or enlarged except that the building built of wood and used exclusively for private dwelling houses may be repaired but shall not be raised or enlarged; nor shall any such wooden structure or part of same within the fire limits be removed to any other place within the same; nor shall any such structure be removed into the fire limits from without the same.

Section V.—No such wooden structure within the fire limits, which may be damaged to the extent of fifty per cent of the value thereof by fire, decay, or any other casualty, shall not be repaired or rebuilt; nor shall any such structure where the damage thereto is less than fifty per cent of its value, be so repaired as to be raised higher than the highest point left standing after such damage shall have occurred; or so as to be in better condition or state of repair than before such damage or so as to occupy a greater space than before the injury thereto. The extent of damage that may be done to any such structure by fire, decay or any other casualty, may be determined by three disinterested citizens of the Village, one of whom shall be selected by the owner or owners of the structure, the second by the majority of the Village Board of Trustees, and the two thus chosen shall select the third. The decisions of the persons so chosen shall be final and conclusive.

Section VI.—Any such wooden structure or parts of the same which may be erected, raised, enlarged, removed, or repaired, contrary to any provision hereof, shall be deemed and is hereby declared to be a nuisance. And the owner or owners of any such structure, and any and all persons employed in assisting about the same shall be fined in a sum not less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for each such offence and the sum of not less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for each twenty-four hours any such structure shall afterwards remain within the fire limits, in any Court having competent jurisdiction.

Section VII.—Any person or persons, firm or corporation, desiring to erect, construct, repair or enlarge any building within the fire limits of said Village shall before doing so, shall submit to the Village Board of Trustees of said Village, a correct statement or plan of the kind of building proposed to be erected, repaired or enlarged, giving a general detail of the material proposed to be used for the construction or enlargement; and if the Village Board of Trustees finds that the said improvement is in compliance with this ordinance, they shall recommend that the President shall issue permit in writing to said person or persons, firm or corporation desiring to erect, repair or enlarge said building. The President shall have the power to issue such permit. Any person or persons, firm or corporation erecting, repairing or enlarging or commencing to do so, without first having obtained a permit to do so, in the manner above stated, shall be subject to a penalty for each and every offence of, not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, nor more than two hundred (\$200.00) dollars.

Section VIII.—All provision or provisions of any ordinance which conflicts with the provision or provisions of this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after passage, approval and due publication as required by law.
