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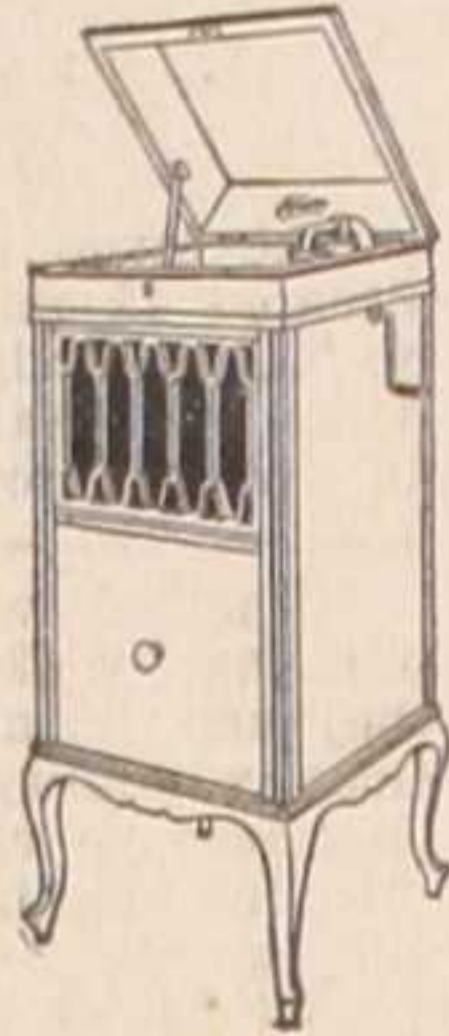

Obituary.

Clarissa S. Ryder, daughter of Charles and Cynthia Ryder, was born September 19, 1842, in Delaware county, New York, and departed this life June 12, 1914, at the age of 72 years, 8 months and 10 days.

While she was still a child she went with her parents to Michigan, settling at Aurelius, where she lived until after her marriage, when she and her husband came to the vicinity of Dwight, Ill., which remained their home with the exception of eleven years which were spent at Girard, Kansas.

It was on New Year's Day, 1858, at Aurelius, Mich., that she was united in marriage with Mr. Henry Wright, Rev. Winslow Turner performing the ceremony. To this union seventeen children were born. Four of these preceded their mother in death, as did also the husband and father in 1906. The surviving children are as follows: Mrs. Ida Brown, Dwight; Frank W., of Crystal Lake; George A., Charles H., of Diamondale, Mich.; Mrs. Lydia A. Dunlap, Harris, Canada; Mrs. Clarissa M. Frump, Girard, Kansas; Mrs. Mary J. Riling, Sunset, Texas; Mrs. Margaret A. Titus, Amo, Colorado; Mrs. Cynthia E. Banks, Girard, Kansas; Wm. M., John F., Grand Ridge; Mrs. Phoebe Duffy, Dwight, and Ralph D., of Chicago. Besides these children she is also survived by the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Lafayette Miles, Grand Rapids, Mich.; Leonis Ryder, Pleasanton, Mich.; Mrs. Ambrose Orr, Greeley, Col.; Mrs. Geo. Kyler, St. Cloud, Florida; and also by forty-two grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.

While living in Girard, Kansas, she united with the Baptist Church, and her church membership remained there to the time of her decease.

Much might be said by way of eulogy on this life which has now passed to other scenes. If suffering brings out character, surely the last five years of intense pain has placed her among the immortals whose robes have been washed white in the blood of the Lamb, who came up through great tribulation. Like all true mothers, her home was her all, yet her heart was large enough to reach out to others. Surely in the rearing of her large family, with the great labor and sacrifice which is always called for, she has done a great work.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ida Brown, and was attended by a large number of friends and relatives. Rev. G. H. McClung officiated. The body was then taken to McDowell cemetery for burial.

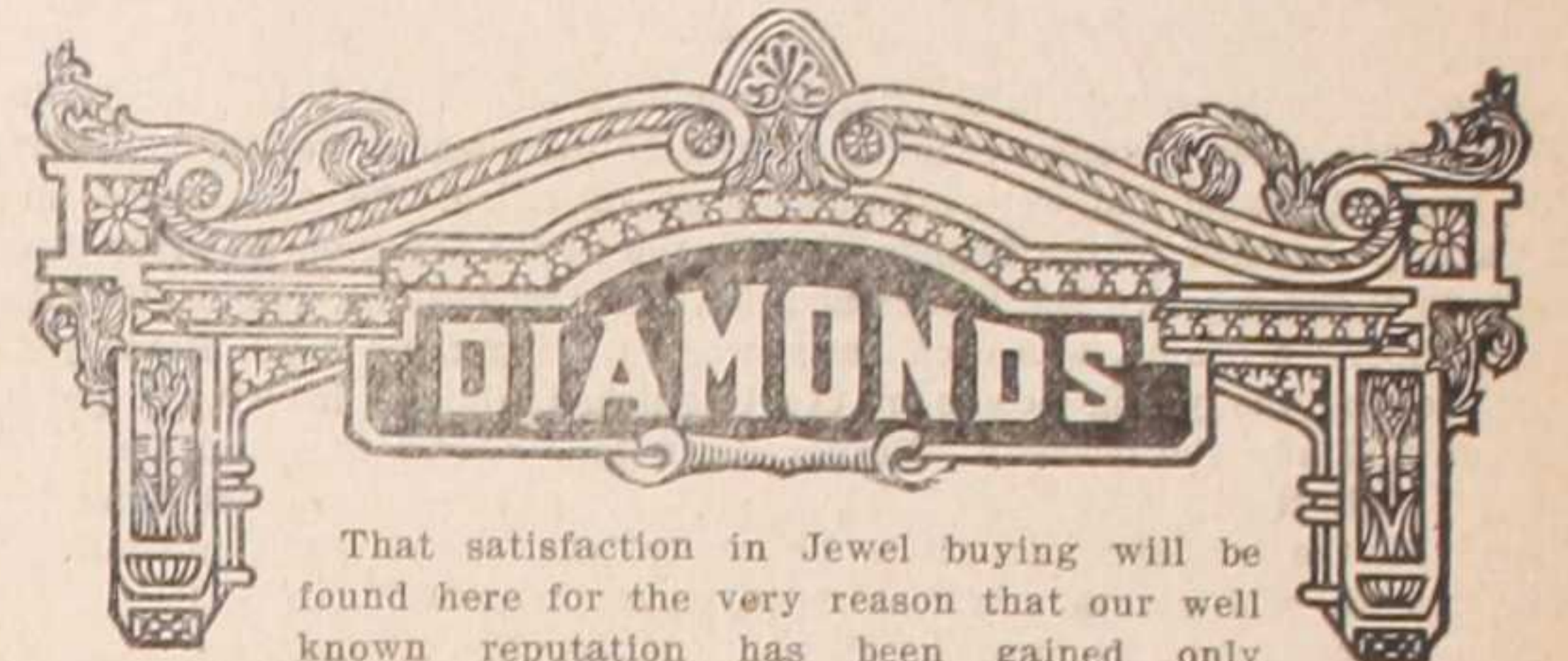

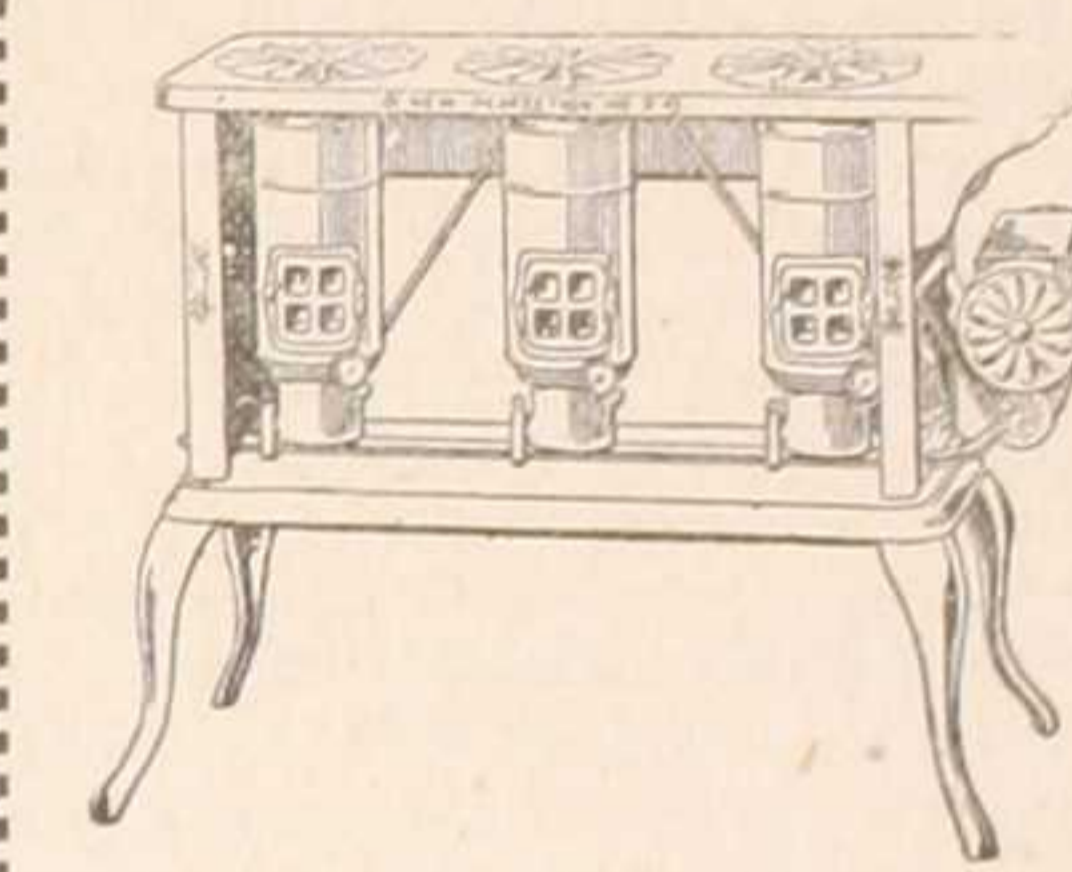
