MEMORIAL SERVICES.

Hebron Lodge, Knights of Pythias, Honor Their Dead at Special Services.

Hebron Lodge No. 175, Knights of Pythias, together with their auxiliary order, the Pythian Sisters, held special services last Sunday morning at the Congregational Church in memory of those of their number who have passed to the Great Beyond. A large representation of the two orders were present—marching to the church in a body, headed by one of the members carrying our national emblem, Old Glory. At the church entrance the Knights of Pythias Lodge opened ranks, allowing the Pythian Sisters to march in first, then fell in behind them, marching to seats reserved for them in the front part of the church.

After the special music numbers by Mrs. E. R. Weart and the choir, Rev. F. F. Farrington delivered a very interesting address taking as his subject, "When the World is in Peril."

A committee from the Lodge went to the cemetery Sunday morning and decorated the graves of the deceased members.

SUGGESTIONS.

It has been proposed by some that for home coming week there should be committees appointed and the work divided between all our citizens—men and women. For instance:

A finance committee, has already been appointed by the general committee headed by Mayor Kelagher, Col. Frank L. Smith, Alderman Peter D. Kern and A. S. Holbrook.

Reception committee consisting of at least twenty-five women and men, to wear badges.

A committee to secure a public hall where visitors and citizens can meet during the times when there is nothing to do but visit.

A committee to arrange a program commencing, say Tuesday the 18th, to provide for "meeting and greeting;" Wednesday, general reception all day, and a musical and literary program for the evening.

Thursday, base ball, band concert and reception to all visitors given by the citizens, in the evening, with such entertainment as the committee see fit.

Friday, base ball, band concert, and banquet at the Livingston free to all visitors, music, speaking by prominent visitors and citizens, and toasts responded to.

Saturday, day of rest and home visiting, and special services at churches Sunday.

There is nothing official about the above, but suggestions from those who have had some experience in other places.

One of the first things to be done is for the General Committee to issue invitations and send them out and that should be done right away, and the names should be handed in as soon as possible.

FORMER DWIGHT RESIDENT DEAD.

Mrs. Phoebe Coe Dies in Chicago at 77 Years of Age.

On June 22nd in Chicago occurred the death of Phoebe Coe, widow of Joel H. Coe, who was well and favorably known to all the old residents of Dwight. Mr. and Mrs. Coe lived in Dwight from 1863 till 1884. In that year the family moved to Bloomington and four years later to Chicago.

Mrs. Coe finished a life of usefulness at the age of 77 years.

She is survived by five sons and two daughters and is mourned by a large circle of friends.

DANIEL CAMPBELL DIES

At Advanced Age of Nearly 85 Years at His Home in the Country.

Mr. Daniel Campbell, a relative of the Shearer family, died last week Friday at the home of his niece, Mrs. Isabella Shearer, five miles south of Dwight. He was nearly eighty-five years old, and had lived near Dwight for forty-seven years.

Daniel Campbell, son of Jeanette Sammons and Daniel Campbell, was born August 29, 1829, in Linlithgow, Scotland, and departed this life June 19, 1914, at the age of 84 years, 9 months and 20 days. He came to Canada in August, 1856, at the age of 27, coming to La Salle county, Illinois, in March, 1860. He remained there for seven years, coming to Dwight in 1867, where he lived until the time of his death. He was the youngest of a family of nine, seven of whom have preceded him in death. One brother is living who resides in Australia.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Shearer home in the country, Rev. F. F. Farrington, pastor of the Congregational Church, conducting the services. Miss Cora Adams and Mrs. J. C. Nelson furnished the music. The body was then taken to the Emington cemetery for burial.

The Dwight Chautauqua.

The Renfrew Park commissioners have given their consent to the holding of the Chautauqua there, giving their consent on account of feeling that the general public desired this location. The decision of the commissioners will be received with appreciation by everybody as it appeared to be the logical place.

Now that the location has been definitely decided upon every effort is being put forth in the selling of the tickets and making general arrangements. Everybody should take hold in this matter and help the committees in any way possible.

The Chautauqua is not a money-making scheme from the local standpoint (at least it is not expected that will be the case) but it is something that will be interesting and beneficial to everybody in the community, and therefore should receive the liberal support of every citizen.

The programs as outlined in the prospectus contain several high-class numbers among which are the Luzerne Concert Co., Mason's Jubilee Singers, Lindsborg Male Chorus, Fahlen Breach Concert Co., and the Imperial English Bell Ringers. The list of speakers and lecturers includes Mohammad Ali, Alexander Corkey, Dr. Crowe, Dr. Eaton, Col. Gearhart and Hon. J. K. Coddling.

The price of the adult's season ticket, \$1.50, makes the cost of each entertainment only 12½ cents, a very low price for some of these numbers. If you attend only six of the entertainments you are getting them at a cost of 25 cents each.

Postoffice News.




