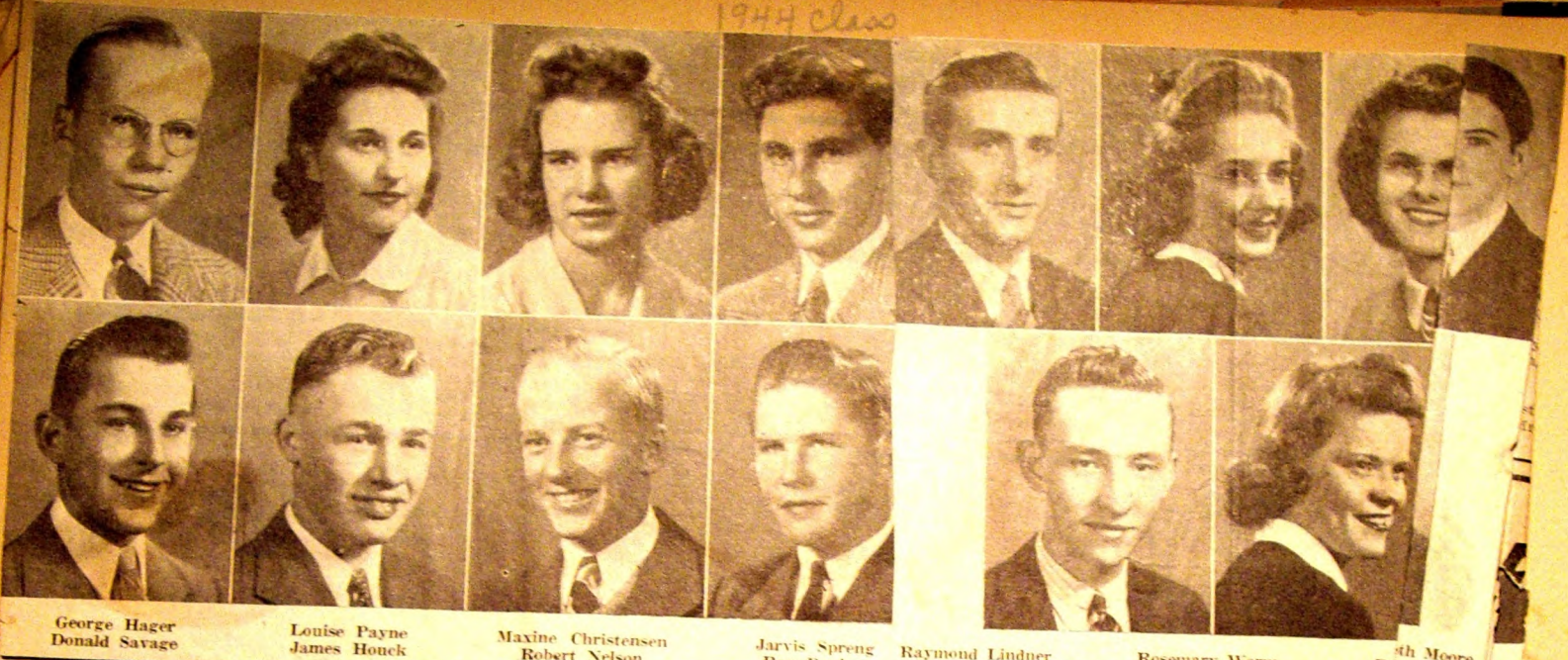
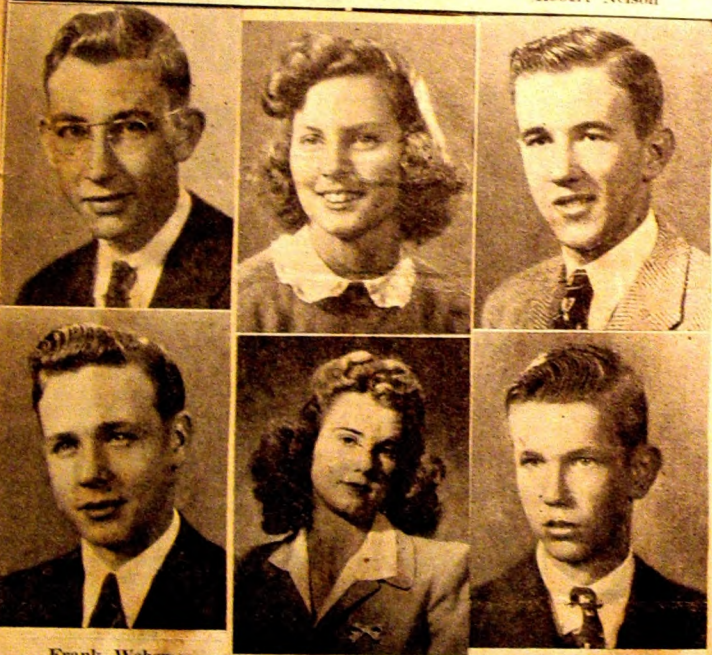

**FOUR GENERATIONS  
OF THE MRS. MARY  
GANTZERT FAMILY**

We present this week a picture of four generations of the Mrs. Mary Gantzert family, well known residents of Goodfarm and Dwight. The fact of this picture showing four generations of the Gantzert family is not unique in itself, as Mrs. Gantzert has other great-grandchildren who make four generations, but the importance of little one-year old Roland is that he is the only male child so far, of the fourth generation to carry on the name of Gantzert, the other great-grandchildren all being females. Ernest J. Kelch and son, Clifford Kelch, are the proprietors of Kelch's Sanitary Dairy, and have been serving the public of this community with Pasteurized Milk for more than 30 years. This dairy is located east of Dwight on Route 17, and the most modern equipment is used in pasteurizing the raw milk. They have two milk trucks which have replaced the "horse and carriage method of by-gone days" for delivering milk to their customers early in the morning. Both have been "riding the route" long enough to deliver a large amount of Dairy Products in this thriving community. The well-known milk bottle has received little rough usage from the hands of these veterans in the milk business—their breakage is approximately 2 out of 20,000—insuring their customers against waking to that tune of tinkling glass. Mr. Ernest J. Kelch lives at his home near the dairy, while his son Clifford lives in town on West Mazon Avenue. They both enjoy their work. It's done on a big scale these days—this "a-milking we will go"—yes indeed, to the tune of one-ton loads and 300 calls each day, and brother, that's plenty of bottles.
